



# AIA Newark & Suburban Architects

## 2020 DESIGN AWARDS BOARD REQUIREMENTS

Members of AIA Newark and Suburban are cordially invited to submit entries for our annual design competition. (See Eligibility below)

### Categories are as follows:

- Residential, Single Family or Multi-Family,
- Non-Residential,
- Institutional,
- Historic Preservation,
- Residential or Non-Residential interior or featured element
- Students and Unlicensed Emerging Professionals

Projects can be built or unbuilt. Gold, Silver and Bronze Award medals may be awarded.

### Eligibility:

Architects-The program is open to registered architects who are regular members or professional associate members in good standing of AIA Newark and Suburban Architects. Submissions can be by members in a joint venture (JV) with another firm. That JV Firm does not have to be a member but the primary design responsibilities must have been the member's. The project location can be anywhere in the world. The program is open to architectural and interior projects of all sizes, types, scopes and complexity.

**NEW!** Students and Unlicensed Emerging Professionals-The program is open to students of NJIT and Kean University who are currently enrolled in the architecture program or graduates pursuing licensure. The projects may be of any size or building type. These projects will be judged separately from the architects.

### Virtual Submittal Requirements:

Submissions are to be formatted for printing on 40" x 40" boards (AIANJ Design Day Awards format) but printing is not required (at this time). The entry must be submitted as PDF documents in 2 separate files. (1) "Jurors' Version" must have all names or references to your firm removed. (2) "Presentation Version" may have all your firm's name and logos included. Files must be titled with the version name. The Presentation Version should have the name/logo of the architect located in the bottom 2" of the board and not appear in any text. Additionally, all versions of boards should feature the name of the project, if it is built or un-built, the location, a description of the project, and dates of construction (if applicable).

It is strongly recommended (but not required) to limit text and focus on descriptions of the design challenge and the architect's specific response - not marketing. Boards are most successful when they are accompanied by site and floor plans, conceptual diagrams, sections, select details, and (if possible) photographs. Provide credits for all photographs. CAD drawings are customary and clear but hand drawing, painting, models and renderings can help set projects apart.

All projects have to have been built or designed (if unbuilt) after January 1, 2016.
